

Background:

Comcast of Colorado IV, LLC requested that the County grant a 10 foot-wide easement on 1,750 square feet in the northwestern corner of Crown Hill Park. The County will receive a \$1,500 processing fee and a \$1,640 real estate fee for a total of \$3,140 for the easement. Comcast will be required to reclaim the area to the County's satisfaction.

Staff Recommendation: Approve the revival, renewal and amendment of the contract between Jefferson County and LFI Fort Pierce Inc. dba Labor Finders in an amount not to exceed \$145,000.00 for temporary flagger services. The County's Representative is the Larry Benshoof, or other person as may be designated by the Department Director or County Manager.

The renewal term is April 28, 2016 through and including April 27, 2017.

Resolution No. CC16-162

Background: Jefferson County's Road and Bridge Division requires the use of temporary flaggers to provide traffic control assistance during County maintenance activities. Utilizing temporary contracting services helps augment the County's traffic control and safety programs when additional people are required, without needing to increase its permanent full-time workforce.

The original contract was approved by the Board of County Commissioners on April 28, 2015, and allows for three one-year optional renewals. This request represents the first renewal option.

The vendor has requested an average six percent (6%) increase in pricing for the renewal term. Road and Bridge staff has determined this amount to be reasonable and acceptable.

Fiscal Information: Funding for services in 2016 is available from the 2016 OPS budget. Funding for services in 2017 is contingent upon approval of the 2017 budget. This is within the scope and budget for these services.

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SHARP(er)/ SMART(er) JeffCo Activity

The SHARPER(er)/SMART(er) JeffCo process employs real-time crime analysis combined with proven and innovative crime reduction techniques. This requires area commanders to immediately identify and address current crime conditions and prevent future ones from arising. Staff members from all three precincts meet monthly to discuss crime trends, quality-of-life issues, crime prevention techniques and solutions.



The SHARP(er)/SMART(er) JeffCo process has identified the below areas for Patrol in the first quarter:

Greenbelt Burglaries


Between January and March there have been five burglaries reported to homes adjacent to the green belts in the 6th Avenue Estates area. In all cases the homes had either short fences, or none at all. In two of the instances entry was made through the garage while the other three were through the home.



Internal awareness has been achieved using the SMART process making possible the identification of patterns and methods. Inter-Division and agency cooperation has resulted in information sharing and tracking future crime statistics of the targeted area. A suspect video, photos and leads were obtained and the investigation, public awareness and direct patrols are ongoing.

Sexting

Sexting is currently a Felony crime which taxes Patrol (often School Resource Officers) and the Crimes Against Children Unit. All cases require a complete Felony filing with the District Attorney's Office. In most cases the charges are dropped upon successful completion of a class.



In a most recent case from Evergreen Middle School one single image sent via Snapchat was shared with at least 14 juveniles resulting in hours of investigative work. While there is pending legislation (HB-16-1058) to reduce the classification to a misdemeanor, work is being done to educate our juvenile population. School Resource Officer Everhart currently teaches multiple sexting classes per year beginning at 5th grade.



Brand New Logo

In July of 2015, the Sheriff's Office engaged a leadership committee, comprised of a cross section of supervisors, to rewrite our mission, values, and vision. The finished product is a blueprint for how all members of the Sheriff's Office should live their professional lives, and most clearly defines who we are and what we do for our community.



Creating a symbol to express these ideals has been exciting. It is the visual evidence of our mission, our values, our vision. The new logo represents a fresh opportunity for our stakeholders to rally around our new slogan.

We're proud to announce a branding initiative designed to create a consistent, unified look of Sheriff's Office promotional materials. The logo captures and engenders a sense of pride among our fellow employees and all those who live, learn, work and play in Jefferson County. After months of focus group testing Public Affairs presented the launch effort to command staff.

We are optimistic that the branding initiative will do wonders for helping us present a consistent, unified image. The logo is brought to life by a dimensional metallic quality. The logo aptly makes note of our 150 plus year history and includes our newly identified slogan, 'sworn to protect, honored to serve'. The logo is made complete by two arcs encircling the traditional seven-point star badge – some things never go out of style. The transformation evokes a modern, sophisticated, and bold design.

"The logo is just a symbol – a visual representation of the Sheriff's Office's strength," Sheriff Jeff Shrader said. "The real strength in our organization is our employees and the services we provide that make the Sheriff's Office brand exceptional."

School Resources Officers

Each of the 10 School Resource Officers (SROs) work 208 days within Jefferson County Public Schools. These deputies are first responders, but are unique in that they develop relationships with students, faculty, and staff. The SRO deputies ultimately serve to provide a safe and secure learning environment.

Just in Time

In the days after the late March snow storm a 68-year-old man had just stepped inside from shoveling a strip of his driveway when his heart stopped. His wife called 911 and Deputy Dillman arrived first on scene. Dillman performed CPR and the pulse returned—a feat he has only witnessed one other time in his 16 year career.

Deputies Springfield and Youngs arrived as the ambulance was taking the man to the hospital for recovery. The three stayed behind and shoveled the driveway so that the wife could get in and out if needed. The story of these deputies going above and beyond went viral on social media receiving praise nationwide.



Average Response Times to Priority One Calls

A priority one call is defined as ‘calls for service which are critical and in-progress, where immediate intervention is required to avert personal injury, or where prompt arrival is necessary to effect criminal apprehension’.

The target response time to priority one calls are varied based on the precinct. For the mountainous areas of unincorporated Jefferson County a greater response time is anticipated while responses in more densely populated areas is typically less. The table below represents the time a call is created by a call taker in dispatch to the time the deputy arrives on scene.

Staffing JCSO

As of March 30, 2016, JCSO was considered 97.6 percent staffed with sworn personnel (528 out of 541 authorized). Fourteen sworn employees were on continuous FMLA or military leave and 39 are currently in field training or the Academy. Staffing shortages have been supplemented with individuals who have retired and returned as part-time employees.

In 2015, the turnover rate for sworn including retirements was about eight percent. The projected turnover rate for the remainder of 2016, based on the past three months will be about 13.7 percent. The ideal attrition rate is about six percent.

Supporting Park County

A shooting in Park County on February 24 resulted in the death of one deputy and injuries to two others. Corporal Nate Carrigan was pronounced dead at the scene.


The Park County Sheriff's Office shares more than half of the western border of Jefferson County. Since the day of the shooting, seven of their deputies who were involved in the shooting were placed on leave during the investigation.

Based upon a request for mutual aid the JCSO responded to the scene with SWAT, Bomb, and K-9 resources. and also replaced Park County patrolling services for the three weeks leading to the funeral.

In addition, the JCSO provided:

- Motorcade escorts for funeral services and procession
- Media liaison
- Arranged two press conferences
- Photography for funeral and procession

In total, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office devoted more than 1,900 hours of service to the needs of Park County.





Prevention & Education Efforts

Active Shooter Training

The leadership in the Court Security Unit identified the need of active shooter training for the JeffCo workforce earlier this year after receiving concerns from several judges. An active shooter is defined as an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a populated area. Partnering with human resources, state judicial, county and state employees, the Sheriff's Office developed a 1.5 hour pilot class covering concealed and open carry laws, county rules and responsibilities and protocol. Initially twelve classes were offered averaging 50 attendees. Soon after, five additional classes were requested with 75 attendees on average— and a wait list began with more than 125 individuals. In total, 1,007 county and state employees were trained in a six week period. The Sheriff's Office was also asked to perform six on-site assessments in many locations throughout the campus.

Crime Prevention Unit

The Sheriff's Office has a dedicated team of four certified crime prevention deputies (two full-time and two part-time deputies) whose sole purpose is to work with citizens to prevent crime. Through on-site visits, phone calls, special events, Nextdoor.com submissions and other opportunities these deputies share vital information with the public to keep crime at bay.

The Crime Prevention Unit is available to speak on a variety of public safety topics. They also offer home and business security surveys, and attend home owner, realty and business watch association meetings.

Citizens' Academy

Aligned with their efforts, the Crime Prevention Deputies are actively involved in the Citizens' Academy. Classes are held one night a week for ten weeks at the Sheriff's Office in Golden. Topics include information on specific units including Patrol, Public Affairs, SWAT, Investigations and Detention Services. Also discussed are issues such as child abuse, use of force, community policing and domestic violence. There are also demonstrations from the K-9s, SORT Team, and Bomb Squad to name a few.



Making Connections

Elk Lodge Deputy of Year

In March, Deputy Caro was formally recognized by the Golden Elks Lodge #2740. Deputy Caro is credited for his efforts in the Applewood neighborhood, specifically a home where renters were causing a quality of life concern. Deputy Caro recovered two stolen cars and arrested a male in possession of 71 grams of meth and a handgun. Through most of 2015, North Precinct deputies on several shifts contacted several different individuals coming and going from the house as well as recovered another stolen car. Deputy Caro didn't stop there with his efforts. He made contact with the out-of-state homeowner who chose to pursue an eviction process that later involved Investigations, the Drug Task Force, SWAT, and the Civil Unit. Upon being awarded Deputy Caro said, "If that was my neighborhood, I would have expected the same law enforcement response to the problem."



A Chance to Help

A citizen noticed the man sitting on a branch on the ground near 77th and Indiana streets and after talking with him he became worried he might be suffering from some mental health issues and called the Sheriff's Office. Deputies Bradley and Valbert found Henry, who was homeless and felt he had just been kicked out of a VA home. He was lost, broke and didn't know where to go so he got in his truck and started driving until he ran out of gas. He left his truck on the side of the road and walked up the hill, ran out of breath and sat on the branch.



Deputies used their own money to fill Henry's gas can and give him some additional cash after using the push bar on the patrol SUV to get the stuck truck out of the ditch. He was then escorted back to the VA house, where they helped him get to the Denver Rescue Mission.

Service to Community

School Resource Officer Joslin happened to be driving to his assigned school when he came upon a father and daughter whose vehicle had run out of gas on North Turkey Creek Road. They were patiently waiting for AAAs services, but readily accepted the offer made by Deputy Joslin to drive the daughter the remainder of the way to school. Deputy Joslin stopped again to check on the father and offered to drive him home to get a gas can.



The father wrote, "In today's age of cynicism and mistrust, I am grateful for the sincere service to the community by Deputy Joslin, AND for the leadership that created an environment of service and trust that allowed the Deputy to reach out to me that day."

In January, the Crimes Against Children Unit received 56 new cases to investigate. In February and March, 58 and 54 cases were received, respectively.

Crimes Against Persons

A female who had been missing from JeffCo since December of 2015 was found deceased in Adams County near the Willis Case Golf Course. There were no signs of trauma, and it is unclear how she died. The case was closed.

Patrol responded to a home in the South Precinct where a five month old baby had stopped breathing. The baby was transported and died the following day. An investigation deemed the cause of death to be SIDS with no criminal act.

Sex Offender Registration

In the first quarter of 2016, three employees assigned to sex offender management maintained more than 452 sex offender records.

Traffic Safety Programs

The DriveSmart organization recently recognized JeffCo Lt. Lucas for his role the past few years in improving motor vehicle safety in the mountain communities specifically with his assistance with Child Passenger Safety, Teen Motor Vehicle Safety and Motorcycle Safety programs.



Honoring Sgt. Renfro

On March 18, the Colorado Legislature approved a bill to rename a portion of Hwy 285 to bear the name of Sergeant Sean Renfro. Sean was killed in a crash on the snowy highway when a driver lost control, crossed over the center line, and struck him, a bystander, and one of the vehicles involved in the original crash.



The Traffic Unit has previously designated this stretch as a focus area and recognizes that the re-naming will provide awareness to the need for drivers to be attentive and cautious.

Move Over

Deputy Kirin was walking to a 20-car pileup on I-70 near the Chief Hosa exit when a gold hatchback struck her and kept going. Deputy Kirin, a four-year veteran of the Sheriff's Office, was taken to the hospital where she was treated for a broken wrist.



Despite the severity of what happened to her, Deputy Kirin could only think about the safety of others. She invited the media to come speak with her so that she could relay her concerns. She asked that drivers remember to move over and slow down whenever they see emergency lights on a roadway. The Colorado State Patrol, who handled the investigation, identified and arrested the driver of the vehicle in Westminster.




Craigslist Robbery

On January 24, deputies responded to a report of multiple shots fired in the area of S. Taft Court. The homeowner had placed an ad on Craigslist and was robbed by gunpoint. The homeowner was able to free himself and fire upon the two suspects as they left. One was killed, and the other arrested on a \$500,000 bond. After thorough investigation, the case was presented to the District Attorney and the actions of the homeowner were deemed justified.

- In the first quarter of 2016, increased patrols, late night investigative stops, and the coordination of the Directed Operations Unit (DOU) with the Metro Auto Theft Task Force led to the identification of more than twenty suspects in one sector in Denver, and of three separate residences in South JeffCo housing vehicle trespass and theft suspects. In a raid to one home on April 12, four individuals were arrested on outstanding warrants and three others on drug charges. The suspects seek crimes of opportunity and are motivated by immediate financial gain. In most cases they have criminal histories and are associated with illicit drugs. The entire Denver metro area is experiencing an increase in motor vehicle trespasses, burglaries, and motor vehicle theft.

- Seven 'smash and grab burglaries' occurred to commercial businesses (a pharmacy, liquor store, cleaners, and restaurants) in JeffCo in the first quarter. Lakewood and Castle Rock experienced more than 25 similar burglaries within a few days. An investigation of a suspicious vehicle in the vicinity of a previously burglarized liquor store was linked to other metro area 'smash and grabs' as well as the recovery of a stolen vehicle.
- Especially in March, the county experienced a dramatic increase of trespasses to mailbox clusters; specifically in Genesee, Lookout Mountain, and Coal Creek Canyon. There were 94 mailboxes burglarized in the first quarter. Extra patrols were initiated in cluster areas, as well as education efforts asking residents to check their boxes daily. While most often this time of year tax returns are the prey, investigations have revealed an organized crime spree. A suspect has been identified via fingerprints. The suspect has local ties but lives in another jurisdiction. The Directed Operations Unit is honing in on the arrest.
- On March 17 a rash of burglaries occurred to a row of attached garage units at Mountain Gate, Redstone Ridge, and Deer Creek condos. The suspect gained entry to one unit and broke their way into the adjacent units by smashing through the drywall. In all, 13 units were burglarized.

- In February, four unlocked vehicles were stolen from driveways while running in the Ken Caryl Valley. To date there were no recovered steals in the areas of the motor vehicle thefts.
- A nationwide increase in motor vehicle thefts has necessitated partnership with other agencies and the Metro Auto Theft Task Force. All areas in JeffCo have been affected, but three clusters of neighborhoods more so than others; one cluster of south JeffCo neighborhoods experienced 17 motor vehicle thefts and recoveries in the first quarter. Two adjacent districts experienced a total of 23 thefts and recoveries. Sixth Avenue Estates of north JeffCo experienced 14 thefts and recoveries. Lakewood, Denver and DougCo are also experiencing the increase. Three focus homes in South JeffCo have been attributed to much of the activity in motor vehicles thefts, trespasses and burglaries. The Directed Operations Unit is making links, and building cases.
