

Parking Concerns

As temperatures increased, so did the visitors to Evergreen. Special events and popular places experienced an influx of vehicles resulting in parking concerns.

'No Parking' signs were ignored, and as a result 102 total parking violations were issued at Alderfer Three Sisters, 69 at Elk Meadows, and 72 at Evergreen Lake in the month of May. The goal for ticketing was to keep the streets safe and allow emergency vehicles access. Deputies continue to monitor these areas throughout the summer.

On June 19, 2014 personnel from the Patrol Division (30), Investigations Division (8), Detentions Division (15), Communications Unit, Gang Unit, AirOne Helicopter, and SWAT were called to the Red Rocks Amphitheater shooting. Those responding reported 264 regular pay hours. Of those responding, overtime was issued with a total of 270.25 hours; a total overtime cost of \$12,262.10.





Sheriff's Office Investigators often work with the fraud units of major financial institutions and credit card companies to track down identity thieves. With a nationwide increase in frauds, the JCSO is streamlining its approach with the use of a Fraud Reporting Hotline that was unveiled in January.

Fraud, Economic, and Elderly Crimes.

Forgery and Theft. On April 14th the victims of this case called to report that their son had stolen \$1,600 worth of checks from them and passed them in various businesses.

ID Theft. On April 17th, deputies were called to the Western Convenience Store for a male that pumped gasoline into his vehicle and could not pay for it. Upon contact with the male he identified himself by a paper birth certificate. The deputy found that the male was not the owner of the certificate. The male was placed into custody and found to have in his possession an ID card in another name, a debit card in a third name, and counter checks in yet another name. Deputies discovered the suspect had opened a bank account using a false name to acquire a debit card and checks. An investigator followed up the same day with a hotel in which the debit card was used. The hotel clerk submitted to a lineup and a warrant was authorized the same day.

JCSO asked citizens in April to respect blue spaces. When resources allowed, deputies issued warnings to violators. The warnings explained the commissioner's revision to the fine associated with parking privileges for persons with disabilities. A newsletter was created as well as a violation warning to be placed on windshields.

Respect Blue Spaces



In an effort to discourage illegal parking and seek voluntary compliance, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office is issuing warnings to violators who fail to display appropriate disability placards.

On March 11, 2014, the Jefferson County Board of County Commissioner's adopted a revision increasing the fines associated with parking privileges for persons with disabilities (42-4-1208). The traffic infraction for unauthorized parking in a designated disabled parking spot will now result in a fine of \$350 for the first offense, and \$600 for subsequent offenses. The ordinance took effect on April 11, 2014.

The State of Colorado issues license plates and placards to qualified persons with disabilities to park in reserved parking spaces. Disability parking is provided to assure that individuals requiring additional space to enter or exit their vehicles have the needed space and accommodates closer parking to a main entrance. The disability parking privilege allows a qualified individual to park in any space marked with the International Symbol of Access (blue spaces).

The State of Colorado offers identifying license plates and placards for persons with disabilities to park in reserved parking spaces. A person with a disability may apply for:

- An **identifying placard** to be prominently displayed on a motor vehicle used to transport such person with a disability.
- A distinguishing **license plate** to be displayed on a motor vehicle owned by such person.
- If the person with a disability is also a Disabled Veteran as determined by 42-3-213(5), C.R.S., that person may elect to display the **Handicap Disabled Veteran license plates**.



Identifying license plates or placards can be issued to a person by submitting a completed DR 2219 **Persons with Disabilities Parking Privileges Application** to the County Motor Vehicle Office. The application must be signed by the applicant or representative.

Unattended Deaths

Deputies routinely respond to death reports. When the death is deemed an 'unattended death' the Crimes Against Persons Unit of the Investigations Division is called to investigate.

'Unattended death' is a term for a person who has not been seen by a physician within 3 days immediately prior to the date of death. The Criminalistics Unit is dually responsible in supplying crime scene response and processing, forensic photography, and latent print comparison. A thorough investigation is performed on all homicide, suicide, accidental or suspicious deaths.



Investigators respond to suspicious deaths, deputies respond to all deaths

In the second quarter of 2014, 47 death investigations were conducted by the Persons Unit of the Investigations Division who responded out to 25 scenes.

On May 8, 2014, Investigators responded to the body of a female victim at the Windy Saddle Trail head parking lot. Investigators are working on several leads of the homicide.

On May 15, 2014, Investigators responded to Holmes Gulch Way regarding the death of a missing hiker. The mother had reported the hiker missing the previous day. Alpine Search and Rescue, K9 units, and deputies scanned the area. Investigators confirmed that the body found was that of the missing hiker.



Victim Services Volunteers

In the second quarter of 2014, 17 volunteers donated 1,071 volunteer hours; saving JCSO \$21,420 based on an average victim advocate salary of \$20 an hour.

Victim Services

Primary victims are those directly affected by the crime whereas secondary victims can be family members, or other witnesses. Oftentimes they receive community referrals, and other services.




MV Trespass 2nd Quarter




Motor Vehicle Theft

CAU Unit

The Investigations Division features a distinct unit, which gives special attention to child victims of abuse and sexual assault. The Crimes Against Children Unit works with child victims and their non-offending parents or guardians. Child victims receive direct support and sympathetic assistance throughout the criminal justice process.



Crimes Against Children

84 cases involving crimes against children were investigated in the second quarter of 2014.

Case Closure Stats

In April, the Crimes Against Children Unit investigated 36 cases; 8 were administratively cleared and 28 were cleared by arrest.

In May, 13 cases were investigated; 8 administratively cleared, and 5 were cleared by arrest.

In June, 35 cases were investigated; 7 administratively cleared, and 28 were cleared by arrest.

Database

The Investigations Division maintains the registered sex offender database for those in unincorporated Jeffco only. A complete list of all unincorporated Jeffco registered sex offenders is available at all sheriff's office locations. Registration is required either annually or quarterly based on conviction.




